Streaming Guide to Movies and TV Shows

With Covid-19 lockdown means movie theaters, concerts, plays and more are no longer accessible. Many of us have turned to streaming services for our entertainment. It's been a lifeline. And while more venues will open at some point, there is a consensus that streaming will continue as a source of entertainment.

Here are a number of streaming apps, most available on TVs, tablets and even smartphones either through an app or directly on websites. Many offer a broad range of entertainment, both English language and foreign (most with subtitles and some with a dubbed option), everything from TV shows, movies, documentaries, travel shows, interviews, news and more. The days of cable may be gone.

Please note: Many shows start on one platform then later move to another. That has been very true of shows I first watched on AcornTV which are now available on Netflix or Amazon Prime. All platforms add new shows - none as often or as many as Netflix, even during the pandemic.

Also note: Some services charge a monthly fee then some shows and movies cost an additional sum per viewing. This is not true of Netflix and AcornTV. Most offer a free trial. And, some have a tier of prices, some cheaper if you accept commercials.

TSO Seminar on Retirement Living Options

As many people "get on" in years, decisions regarding where to live become more important. There are a number of potential directions and the differences between them are often confusing. On August 25th, Joan Rettmann, Area Community Relations Director of ERA Living provided information on important ways to think about the options that could be involved when planning for our future. Even the most basic question of "*How can I better understand if it's the right time for me to move?*" can be difficult to sort out. Some of the questions she suggested to help answer that include ...

• How does your life compare now to 5 years ago? • What do you envision it will look like 5 years from now? • Are you surviving or thriving in your current home? • How often do you socialize with others – Daily? Monthly? • Are you living on processed foods and microwavable meals? • Are you a caregiver for a spouse/partner and feeling that is your primary identity? • Have you had a fall or health scare in the past year? • Have you been diagnosed with MCI (Mild Cognitive Impairment) or a form of dementia? • How would moving affect your time with family?

Then the trickier topic of the kind of housing community to select becomes the focus. The options here need to be carefully studied. There are several different types of retirement communities that can provide what you need but you should look into the details of what each provides and what will be required from you if you decide to become a resident. We are facing only online instruction programs, not to mention club meetings and the business meetings of the Council itself. We are responding very well to these challenges.

We are in the near-completion stage of adopting new Bylaws and Standing Rules for our operation ably prepared by Steve Denison and the Events Committee. We hope to submit the Bylaws to the membership before the end of the year. They will modernize the program substantially.

We have established two new Committees to work with the Council in Marketing and in studying the Future of TSO and the TELOS support it offers. We as always focus on the Curriculum Committee and its head, Chris Steele, who is very much a linchpin in our TELOS support. We also continue our efforts through VP Chuck Kimbrough to re-establish the ability to receive a student fee for our financial support.

We have had a successful and gratifying introductory meeting with the new interim President (who does not embrace the title), Gary Locke. He listened to and then responded to our interests. He is supportive of the TELOS program and we look forward to a great relationship with the College administration. But we are now facing a loss of two staff members important to us: Dipali Desai and Miste Damrill. We wish them well and are sorry that the reduction of other Community Education programs required this force reduction. We are glad to have survived this economizing cutback.

TSO needs the continuing support of its entire membership: in participating in online courses, in referring new course and instructor ideas, and in being active in the TSO organization. We will get through the virus stronger than ever but only with your active support.
