#### Magazine and Newspaper Subscriptions

We're biased, but a year of print and unlimited digital access to <u>WIRED</u> costs \$5 per year for students and educators. Students can also save on subscriptions to <u>The Economist</u>, <u>The New York Times</u>, <u>The Wall Street Journal</u>, <u>The Atlantic</u>, <u>Bloomberg</u>, and more. If there's a magazine or newspaper that you frequently read, it's likely that you can get a discount when you subscribe.

#### **HP Education Discounts**

Sign up for HP education discounts by verifying your .edu email address. HP says eligible shoppers may be able to save up to 77 percent off on select products.

#### Microsoft Back-to-School Deals

Microsoft offers up to 10 percent off a variety of products, including Surface devices and accessories. (https://www.wired.com/story/microsoft-surface-buying-guide/) Parents and students are both eligible.

#### **Discounts on Verizon Phone Plans**

<u>Unlimited plans</u> are discounted by as much as \$25 per month for college students. As is usual with cell phone service providers, terms and conditions apply, but it's worth looking into if you're a Verizon customer (or considering making a switch.)

#### \$5 off YouTube Premium

Typically, YouTube Premium costs \$12 per month, but the cost drops to \$7 for students. The membership includes access to both ad-free YouTube videos and ad-free YouTube Music. There's a one-month free trial if you're interested in trying it out.

In a large, open room with plenty of space at the Redmond Community Center, almost 40 TELOS students listened to popular instructor John Bishop as he relayed stories of how ingenious music entrepreneurs provided teens throughout England and much of Europe with the 60's rock & roll hits the BBC radio stations refused to play. They accomplished this by broadcasting radio programs of the popular music from ships (known as radio pirates) anchored in international waters in the North Sea just outside of the three mile limit. From that location, they were able to avoid government restrictions on the music that was deemed worthy of broadcast as well as the expense of paying royalties to the companies producing the music that was played. John's presentation was even more interesting due to the personal stories he told of his experiences as both a police officer in England and fan of the radio pirates during that time.

### The President's Report

Telos Student Organization is working with College staff to accommodate a move of all TELOS in-person courses to Main Campus in (maybe) Fall of 2024. We also continue our efforts to re-establish a very modest student fee added to TELOS registration to support the seminars and other TSO programs of value to membership. TSO is very fortunate to have the wonderfully effective Curriculum Committee Chair Donna Obrembt to spearhead the very interesting between-quarter seminars. She is great!

TSO is also fortunate to have a Council that has both "old timers" with a lot of experience and newer members who bring a fresh look at the program. "Old timer" Jerry Harkleroad has been working on some marketing ideas supporting the TELOS program, including an innovative "yard sign" concept that was initiated just before Fall Quarter. Volunteers placed almost 150 signs which were creatively designed by college staff in conjunction with input from Jerry. Very striking signs that hopefully attracted the attention of the public not previously aware of the TELOS program.

TELOS began some in-person classes in the Summer Quarter. More for the Fall Quarter along with online courses too. But, Murphy's Law intervened and the College will likely close the only elevator at the North Campus building for elevator repairs sometime in Winter quarter (of course it couldn't have been done during the pandemic when the building was closed). At that time, in-person classes will be temporarily moved to Main Campus. Hopefully the mix of online and in-person at N. Campus will resume soon after.

TSO continues to work with college staff on strengthening the TELOS program. We have met with President Locke recently (who will retire next June) and are in regular contact with Dennis Curran who heads up the Main Campus move for the College. Staff attached directly to the TELOS program are joining our monthly Council meetings and making themselves available for our input, which is mutually appreciated. We in the TSO are working hard to fulfill our cardinal purpose of supporting the TELOS program and its growth.

Election of new Council and Officers of TSO will take place next June. Please consider taking a position. It is rewarding and not too demanding of time. Its compensation is the satisfaction from supporting a program of great importance to the health and growth of the Bellevue College TELOS program and to its participants personally.

## Penguins in the Desert?

"Most of us wouldn't think to look for penguins in a desert, but every year, along a windswept edge of coastal Patagonia, hundreds of thousands of Magellanic penguins gather to rear their young at Punta Tombo, Argentina." These are the words of Dr. Eric Wagner, who gave us a seminar on "Penguins in the Desert". He spent 6 months in 2008 studying these "desert" penguins at the largest penguin colony in the world outside of Antarctica, amidst the heat and dust of the desert.

He worked under the direction of biologist Dee Boersman, who having studied these penguins for 40 years, believes that they are "ecosystem sentinels". The field study is to understand why there has been a decline in their numbers (from I million at their peak to half that today); overfishing that reduces their food supply?;

catastrophic oil spills?; looming effects of climate change?; or a combination of all of these.

Despite the 14 hour days, no days off, living in a trailer, losing sleep due to the "braying" of the penguins (known as the jackass penguins for a reason), being repeatedly bitten by them, Dr. Wagner came to find these Magellanic penguins as the "most charismatic creatures on earth". He got to know them well, finding that they endure love (finding a mate), loss (survival rate is low) and divorce (usually because either no chick results from the mating or the chick dies). His stories including one about a "trailer" penguin who nested under his trailer and brayed loudly, long into the night and another about Turbo, who was partial to humans and incubated a rock, were told with humor, warmth and affection for these wonderful birds.

### Too High & Too Steep

Have you ever taken the Underground Tour in downtown Seattle? I took it when I first moved here. It confused me even after I was told it was the result of a fire that nearly burned the city down. I was even more confused when I was told that the city was originally surrounded by several steep hills some of which were washed into the Sound using hydraulic cannons. My confusion was finally cleared up when I attended a TSO sponsored seminar from David Williams based on his book "Too High & Too Steep."

As David (ably assisted by Ted Watts) showed us pictures and maps of early Seattle, we were able to see where the Pioneer Square area, initially known as "The Little Crossing Over Place," was surrounded by mudflats that were 10 to 15 feet below the water level at high tide.

Pine Street, rising from the waterfront gained about 100 feet in elevation in approximately a mile. Denny, however, gained that much elevation in only one block! The idea of introducing "regrades" of the topographic challenges presented by these various elevation changes was an impressive solution. Homes and other buildings on Denny were destroyed, moved or lowered as the "steep and high Denny bluff" was washed into the Sound. Our presenter, David Williams, was able to use his deep knowledge of Seattle and his scientific background to illuminate the physical challenges of these large scale transformations. For more detail, his book, "Too High and Too Steep" is available in both hardcover and paperback.
