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Since the TELOS program began in 1976, the oak tree has been its distinctive symbol. Telos is the Greek word ($\tau \epsilon \lambda o \varsigma$) meaning 'fulfillment'. And that's what the TELOS program offers: an engaging community where adults can fulfill their continuing desire to learn and grow.

TELOS presents a broad range of classes to meet a wide variety of interests. The atmosphere is intellectually stimulating and supportive. Classes are small and informal. Students and faculty interact as peers, making learning a creative exchange of ideas. Many students form lasting friendships.

At TELOS the emphasis is on education and growth, not measuring performance. There are no entrance requirements, grades or tests.

Egyptian Voices: Late Period to Cleopatra

Except for sporadic bursts of energy, the Late Period is marked by disunity and foreign rule. We will look at evidence found in archaeology, architecture, art and literature as the country struggles to come to terms with domination by Nubia, Assyria, Persia and Alexander the Great. After the death of Alexander in 323 BCE, Egypt was ruled by the Ptolemies. The death of Cleopatra in 30 BCE marks the end of the Ptolemaic rule - the last dynasty of ancient Egypt.

Great Foreign Policy Decisions

Great Decisions is a discussion course offered by the Foreign Policy Association. The course includes a book with a chapter on each subject. In class, we watch a DVD, and then discuss the topic. Climate Change Consequences

Students will explore the increasingly important subject of climate change. The class will review the basic physics of climate change and terminology. Students will also explore which emissions and activities are most deleterious, and the tipping points associated with them. Other topics include planetary history, effects in the U.S. and other countries, renewable options and geoengineering, and steps toward implementing a recovery. Fee: \$89

Impressionism is a 19th century movement that revolutionized and shook the conventions of the 19th century French society. Artists like Manet, Monet, Pissarro, Degas and Morisot were in opposition to academic art aimed at representing the ephemeral nature of light and its effects on colors and shapes. Basic Photography Principles

This course introduces students to basic photographic principles and the use of cameras, lenses, and lighting equipment. There will also be a brief overview of the history of photography and the development of cameras and lenses over the last century. To better understand how cameras turn light into images there will be simple explanations and comparisons of how film cameras and digital cameras work. Discussions will include basic composition concepts to enhance images. The course will conclude with information on image file handle and simple image manipulation with basic photo editing tools. Students will also have an opportunity to participate in a fun weekly photo assignment involving shooting a common theme and critiquing the results. Fee: \$89

U.S.-China Relations

This course will examine U.S.-China relations since Nixon opened the door in 1972 and what has occurred to get us to where we are today. Students will examine the cultural archetypes of both Americans and Chinese and how the differences in thinking and behavioral patterns have defined the historic paths of both nations. Students will also compare the two political systems and explore how they have profoundly impacted business, social change and geopolitics across the Pacific and globally. In addition, this course will focus on topics such as how COVID is transforming China and the world; the possibility of China taking Taiwan by force, and why the US and China turned from top trading partners to arch rivals in just a few years. The course will consider possible directions for future U.S.-China bilateral relations. Fee: \$89

ncient Egypt has been a passion for Instructor Cynthia Smith.
Graduating from UCLA with a B.A. and an MBA from Pepperdine
University, Cynthia took evening classes at UCLA learning the history
of ancient Egypt and learned to read and write hieroglyphs. After retiring,
she pursued a master's degree in Egyptian Archaeology from University
College London to fulfill her lifelong passion.

After moving to the Bellevue area, she has created a class at Bellevue College called *Egyptian Voices*. The series covers the Old, Middle, and New Kingdoms of this fascinating culture that lasted 3,000 years, and specific topics ranging from *A Day in the Life* to *Queens and Women of Ancient Egypt*. Students bring a

lifetime of experience to the class, and their questions are thoughtful.

New discoveries prompt reassessment of previously held beliefs and some questions raised in class require searching for an answer. Students interact as peers sharing an exchange of ideas. "Telos offers an opportunity to learn and grow by meeting the intellectual needs and interests of both my students and myself," states Cynthia.

Egyptian Voices: Late Period to Cleopatra will be an online course, starting on April 10, 2023, running 10:00–11:30 a.m. every Monday through June 5, 2023.
