I admit I am an avid reader. I regularly share reading lists with my friends and we talk about our favorites. These interactions broaden the scope of books I read—both fiction and non-fiction. I never was a book club member, probably because I didn't find one that suited me.

When I retired in 2018 I started taking TELOS classes and joined the TSO student organization. I also looked at the other activities that TSO offered and noticed the TSO Book Club and scanned what they were reading. Was somewhat interested. Then I noticed that one book that was going to be discussed soon was "The News of the World" by Paulette Jiles. I had just finished reading it and LOVED it and wanted to hear the discussion about it. That's when I attended my first TSO Book club meeting and I was hooked.

This group of avid readers welcomed me and I so enjoyed the quality of the discussion and interchange of thoughts about the book. I then became a regular attendee. Pre-COVID the monthly sessions (always the 3rd Friday of the month at IPM-2:30 PM) were held in person. During COVID we had a hiatus but then resumed attendance on the Zoom platform which is how we meet today. There are over 50 members but generally we have 10-12 members join each month for the meeting, led by a member who volunteers to direct the discussion.

Mostly, the books we read are great. Sometimes there is a consensus that the book was a good read, other times there are mixed reviews. The group is always welcoming to the members views and often, someone who wasn't enthused about the book changed his/her opinion because of the book discussion. All opinions are respected.

How the club works—members recommend 3-4 books (fiction or non-fiction) for the club to read. A spreadsheet is prepared noting the book, author, # of pages and a brief review of the book. Then at the January meeting the members vote for the books they want to read for the year. Members then select the book and the month in which they will lead the discussion. A calendar is prepared and forwarded to members. The list of books is also posted to the TSO website.

I enjoy the book club for a number of reasons. I truly enjoy connecting with a wonderful group of like-minded readers who love reading as much as I do. Also, it broadens the variety of books I read, some of them I never would have selected on my own and would have missed out on a terrific reading experience. We always welcome new readers. Check us out! We meet the 3rd Friday of each month at IPM via Zoom. Our July read is "There is Nothing for You Here" by Fiona Hill.

## Please Note: Changes to Parking on Campus

(Here is information I received with the new parking rules at BC. It will be easier and allows us to do day parking in any student parking lot. But, it needs to be setup in advance on your smartphone. Payment information is not entered until you actually pay for a parking spot. This can be done from home before leaving to attend class. Jerry Bunce)

Bellevue College is implementing changes to parking procedures on main campus, specifically regarding the purchase and use of parking permits. Starting Summer Quarter 2023 (July 3, 2023) virtual parking permits will be required: Your license plate number will now serve as your parking permit. Gone are the days of physical permits and decals. Instead, a new user-friendly parking portal website has been launched where you can effortlessly manage your parking account online. This digital transformation aims to streamline the parking experience, improve sustainability, and enhance convenience for the campus community.

### Summary of Changes:

1. No more paper or windshield decal permits.
2. Your license plate number will become your permit.
3. Online account management: You will manage your

own parking account online and add up to two cars per permit.

4. Vehicle limit: Only one out of your two registered vehicles may be on campus at any given time.
5. Vehicle swaps: If your vehicle is undergoing maintenance and you have a rental or loaner vehicle, you can easily swap out the vehicle using the parking portal.
6. Online purchase of daily permits: Introducing Aims Mobile Pay (AMP)! You can now conveniently purchase daily permits online through the parking portal by selecting the "Visitor and Daily Parking" tile. You can also download the AMP App or visit [aimsmobilepay.com](http://aimsmobilepay.com) to purchase daily permits. Just type "Bellevue College" into the location search, select the lot you would like to park in, and make your purchase.
7. Cash purchases for daily permits can still be made via the parking meters located in parking lots 12, 16, the Public Safety Office, and the north side of the gymnasium. Just enter your license plate number and select your method of payment. That's it! You no longer need to display a permit on your dashboard.

## Parking Changes on Main Campus (cont'd)

### Unchanged Procedures:

Online [parking portal](#) access: Entering information and purchase of permits will still be made online through the new parking portal.

1. Permit costs: The cost of student permits will remain the same.
  2. Pay or appeal parking citations (tickets): You will still have the option to conveniently pay or appeal parking citations online.
  3. Parking lot designations: The student parking lot locations have not changed.
- ADA parking placards: ADA parking placards can still be used to park in any student, employee, daily, or general parking lot without the need to purchase a parking permit.

### Important Dates and Reminders:

- Purchase of 2023-2024 annual parking permits: You can begin purchasing parking permits for the new academic year starting June 21, 2023.
- Effective date of new permits: Starting July 3, 2023, the new virtual parking permits will be mandatory, replacing the traditional permits. Remember, your license plate will serve as your permit once you complete the order process via the online parking portal.
- Expiration of current permits: Your current Spring Quarter 2023 permit will expire on July 3, 2023.
- When parking on campus, license plates must be clearly visible.
