More than 40 classes are offered this quarter in a number of different areas of study.

Those registering at TELOS this quarter will have many options from which to choose: classes on any weekday (Monday through Friday) and at any of the three class times (9:30am, to 11:00am, 11:30am to 1:00pm, 1:30pm to 3:00pm.)

Some offer information in a traditional lecture format while others use lively class discussions. These non-credit classes are taught in a relaxed atmosphere with an emphasis on learning, growth and fun---not performance. A sample of the topics that will be offered include ...

Arts & Literature: Paintings of India, 20th century art, American comedy, George Eliot, great playwrights, iconic architecture, history of textile industry, Italian and Spanish classical music, jazz, understanding race through literature

History & Politics: Greek mythology, French Revolution, Egyptian voices, Russian history, ancient Chinese history,

capitalism in America, politics of climate change, Supreme Court, the National Park System

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Science & Technology: Bird behaviors, geology of the US West, brain power and nutrition, 21st century genealogy, computer basics (Windows 10), social media, digitizing life, biomedical ethics

Philosophy & Religion: The New Testament, atheists and free thinkers. Mormonism, Quran and human rights, psychology pioneers, wisdom of aging

Interactive Classes: Current events, new ideas, creative writing, writing your stories, T'ai Chi, Feldenkrais, popular dances of 20th century

The TELOS staff is pleased to add a jazz class to its offerings course during winter quarter. It will be taught by long time musician, teacher,

producer, broadcaster, and jazz enthusiast Jim Wilke. He returns to Bellevue College and TELOS starting January, 2016.

Wilke has been producing and directing since 1962

and has earned numerous awards.

"I've been a fan of jazz all my life and I still follow it extensively." He said Jazz is a uniquely American art form. "I've had a lot of interaction with jazz players over the years."

Wilke plans on using plenty of illustrations and examples as he relates the history of jazz over the decades. He said he will use the first class to get a

feeling of where the students are and what they are looking for and then adjust accordingly.

Wilke has produced programs on NBC, NPR, King-FM and KPLU. For 30 years his deep, well-modulated 'radio voice' could be heard on Jazz After Hours on Public Radio International. That program was named top national jazz program. He now hosts **Jazz** Northwest on KPLU.

Many of you may have seen Donny and her husband Robert walking down the halls at TELOS arm in arm. She has been blind for 8 years; a rare complication of back surgery. She has been taking classes since they were held at the NW center and thinks the transition to Bellevue College has been wonderful.

Donny grew up in Omaha, Nebraska and graduated from the University of Nebraska. Her father's side of the family came to the states in 1682 and fought in the revolutionary and civil wars, which qualified her for the DAR. She has two children, and two granddaughters. After earning her bachelors she taught middle school English and History. When she moved to Seattle she went back to school for a Master's in Speech Communication. Later she earned a JD and a Master's in Library and Information Science. She worked in training and development, then did mediation at a law office and later worked for a Seattle law firm doing legal research.

She enjoyed sharing her passion for art as a docent for SAM. She now works with the ACCESS program which provides tours for folks with vision and hearing loss. Donny was asked: What does TELOS mean to you? "I enjoy being a student and learning, more importantly love meeting and getting to know folks and the growing sense of community TELOS has experienced in the last couple of years."

How would you like to be remembered? "As someone who cared, respected other people and who enjoyed life."

What is the most important lesson you learned in life. "When I lost my vision suddenly all my priorities were right there. Bob, my family and friends and that is really what is important."
