With all of the classes that are offered each quarter at TELOS, have you ever wondered who is responsible for all of the facilities at North Campus including the organization of room assignments? Meet Lisa Corcoran, Director of Operations at Bellevue College Continuing Education. Overseeing TELOS room assignments is only a small part of what she does here. Lisa has been in her position for a little over a year and came to us from a position on Main Campus in the office of the President.

Her job includes all back end management for enrollments, revenue, student organization and curriculum for Continuing Education, OLS (Occupational Life Skills) and Year Up. There are twelve employees reporting to Lisa. Her major responsibilities for TELOS include all customer service operations, overseeing assignment of classrooms and building facilities. We really appreciate Lisa for all that she does for our program.

Strange bedfellows: U.S. and Saudi Arabia

In mid-September, Dr. Jim Maynard, M.D., Ph. D. (who has traveled extensively in the Middle East and Asia, has advised the U.S. Agency for International Development and authored over 200 publications) gave a profound seminar on the relationship of U.S. and Saudi Arabia. How can two such disparate countries maintain such a closeness? Saudi Arabia is one of the worst abusers of human rights, the government is an absolute theocracy (less of a democracy than Iran), Osama bin Laden's birthplace, development of Al Qaida and eventually ISIS.

Oil provided the basis for the initial tie but Saudi Arabia now provides less than 13% of U.S. oil need. (Canada is the largest oil importer to U.S.) Saudi Arabia now has the youngest foreign minister in the world in Mohammed bin Salman. He knows oil is coming out of favor and he must attract investment and develop other industries.

Where does the U.S. go from here when current foreign relations appear to be 100% transactional? Will we continue to prop up a royal family that uses extreme dictatorial powers to achieve its singular goals? Many interesting questions to consider.
